Pastor's thoughts ...



People were flocking around John the Baptist. In spite of the fact that the Temple had been restored to its full glory, the priests were fulfilling their functions and sacrifices were being offered, the people were searching for something more. Their firm belief was that they should be doing something in order to obtain that which they were seeking. The question was simple: What should we do? This was not just a simple question put forward by normal, everyday people. Sinners, personified in the tax-collectors, were asking the same question, as well as foreign soldiers assigned to the Holy Land.

If the question was simple, John's answer was equally so. In a nutshell, first he told them to think of others, to share of their goods with those who had less. Then he told everyone to do what he or she should be doing, according to their calling - the simple, everyday life

things.

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Sometimes we might find ourselves in the same situation as the people of John's time. We might have and be blessed with a lot of things in life. But still, we feel that there is something missing in our lives. Perhaps the crucial question, before asking what I should be doing, is, "what am I looking for? What do I really want in life?" I suspect that if we were to make a list of what we really want, joy or happiness would be somewhere at the top of that list. When you think about it, most of the stuff we do, we do it because we want joy. It's amazing how many people seem to have everything and yet lack true joy.

One person came into the world with the promise of joy. At his birth in Bethlehem, this is what the messengers from heaven sang: joy to the world. No one, no race, is excepted from this. The message of joy is for everyone. Christmas, which we shall soon be celebrating, is an invitation to allow Jesus to become present in our lives. Let the life of each and every one of us become that manger where Jesus made an appearance more than two thousand years ago.

John the Baptist's message is as relevant today as it was to his people back then. Helping others with what we have been given is a constant in Jesus' teaching and life. He preached it, and He lived it. He constantly gave of himself, until he reached the climax on the cross. This is the paradox of Christianity. Using the words of the great spiritual writer Ron Rolheiser, "As the Prayer of St. Francis puts it, we can never attain joy, consolation, peace, forgiveness, love, and understanding by actively pursuing them. We attain them by giving them out. That's the great paradox at the center of our spirituality."

The rest is relatively easy: just live what you are called to be. John told the tax-collectors not to over-tax people, and to the soldiers he told them not to abuse the power entrusted to them.

The Son of God became human to give us life, joy and peace. With Zephaniah, the prophet who gave us today's beautiful first reading, we rejoice because is in our midst. The birth of Jesus is tangible proof that our God is not a far-away deity or ideal. He is truly the Emmanuel, the God-is-with-us.
