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Pastor's thoughts ...



We are created for relationships. "It is not good that the man should be alone,' said God in the creation story which we read in today's first reading. It's a picture of a very "human" God who cares for man's needs and tries to do His best to see man happy. So, God continues to experiment with His creative genius, and gives man all kinds of birds and animals to keep him company. All this helped, but was not good enough. God had to learn that it's not easy to make man happy! So, God had to dig deep into His fantastic mind and invented a totally new way of creating something new. He let man go into a deep sleep, and while he was sleeping God took one of his ribs, out of which he formed woman. We can almost feel man's joy and excitement when, on waking up, he found the woman next to him: "at last," he says, "this is bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh".

God's empathy towards man in this story is palpable. God, who had created man in His own image, knows that the man He created has to live in relationships. That's because God Himself is a living and loving relationship. The theology of the Holy Trinity is all about this (without us having to go into its details here today). The stories of creation give us a beautiful picture of this: man living in harmony with nature, with fellow human beings, and with God Himself. This harmony was, alas, destroyed when sin happened. But it was put right again with the coming of Jesus.

The gospel of today speaks to us about a special kind of relationship: that between husband and wife. For us Christians marriage is not just a decision of two people to live together, or a contract which can be terminated at any of the parties' whim. It is a sacrament celebrated between two equal people with a commitment to each other for life. It was not like this in Jesus' time. Equality of the parties was inexistent. The wife was subordinate to the husband. In the best of cases, she was his "most valued possession". The man could, then, divorce his wife even for simply "becoming displeasing" to him. This was of course open for a very wide interpretation, making her displeasing even if her cooking or cleaning was not up to the husband's expectations! Naturally, the woman had no such rights.

When asked about this Jesus chose not to dwell on when a divorce is permissible or not. Rather, he focused his teaching on the equality of both persons in a marriage relationship, and the importance of each person to respect both the other person and the commitment they made for life. He tells them that should any one member of the couple enter into another relationship, irrespective of whether it's the man or the woman, both commit adultery against their spouse.

Having said all this, it is important for us to remember that, as Christians, it is not up to us to judge anyone. We all know couples who have been, or are going, through a rough time in their relationship. We also know couples whose relationship has gone wrong, for whatever reason. Perhaps we have been there ourselves. Each case is unique and God understands each of our stories. The best we can do is pray and entrust ourselves and our loved ones into God's loving arms.
