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Pastor's thoughts ...



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Let's face it: we all love feeling important, respected and appreciated. Perhaps even feeling more important, or special, than others. Some of us openly admit to it, others secretly harbor it in their hearts. The apostles of Jesus were no exceptions. In today's gospel we see two of the chosen twelve, James and John, demanding something from Jesus. They want special places, one being on his right and the other on his left, when He is in His "glory". It is ironic that they ask this when He had just predicted His own death and resurrection. Instead of focusing on the reason behind this future event - Jesus' self-giving love for all humanity - they choose to focus on the glory. And to think that these were two of the three special ones who were always closest to Jesus!

As usual, Jesus takes the opportunity to give them an important lesson. First he warns them that, in order to enter into his glory, they will first have to go through the same process as He does – that of suffering, passion and death, of giving one's own life for the sake of others.

It's beautiful to see in the gospel the reaction of the other ten disciples. Mark says that they became angry at James and John. We can imagine them grumbling amongst themselves, "who do these two think they are? What's so special about them?" Sometimes we might think of the saints or, in this particular case, of the apostles, as some super-Christian heroes who always did the right thing. But the gospel shows us that becoming a disciple requires a learning process. We grow into becoming holy.

When Jesus notices the reaction of the group, He calls them closer to Him and, patiently, continues with his teachings. He tells them not to follow the lifestyle of worldly people. In the world importance means power. According to Jesus' logic, on the other hand, anyone who wants to feel important must be a servant of others. "For

the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve," He tells them, "and to give his life as a ransom for many." The life of the disciple must be modelled on that of the Master.

Looking at today's gospel story we might be tempted to think that we are not like James and John of the gospel. We would never dare tell Jesus to give us the number-one seat in heaven! But how often do we look down on others? How often do we judge others when we notice their mistakes or "sinful life"? How often do we refuse to forgive, or even to be the first to seek some form of reconciliation, when we hurt each other? The words of Jesus keep reminding us that, if we want to be His disciples, we must be servants of all, we must be willing to give our life for them. And this, even when they do not deserve it!


