Pastor's thoughts ...



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Jesus journeys towards Jerusalem. We know what's expecting Him there. He knows it too. More than once he had told his disciples what was about to happen to him there something which they did not like! As they leave Jericho, the last town before entering the great city, a blind man named Bartimaeus becomes aware of His presence, and starts calling Him. Bartimaeus' prayer, eventually, became the prayer which has helped millions of people around the globe in their journey of faith: "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!". The blind man knows who Jesus is: the Son of David which, for all those hearing him, immediately meant the Messiah. Bartimaeus knew that Jesus was the fulfillment of the prophecy of the seed of David as foretold by the prophet Nathan. He was the one who could give him what he really needed. We remember how important it is to know who Jesus really is. Early in the gospel Jesus had asked this question to his disciples: Who

do you say that I am? The danger to follow a false God is always real!

Interestingly, those around Bartimaeus, instead of encouraging and helping him to approach the Master, tried to shut him up. This is something that often happens to us, too, in our prayer. How often do we tell ourselves, or hear others telling us, "Don't bother praying ... It's all pointless ... God is too busy to hear your prayers ..." Yet, Jesus orders those same people to bring Bartimaeus to Him. Jesus could have called Bartimaeus Himself, but He ordered those people who were following Him to call the blind man. This is one important task of Jesus' disciples, of each and every one of us: to encourage people in their prayers, to help people get closer to Jesus. Those people in the gospel had had the opportunity to see, hear and experience Jesus. Their job was to enable others to do the same.

Today we happen to be celebrating World Mission Sunday. In his message for today Pope Francis talks precisely

about this fact: that "We cannot but speak about what we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:20). This is the mark of the disciple, sharing with others what we ourselves have experienced.

Back to our story: finally Jesus asks the blind man, "What do you want me to do for you?" It is the same question He had asked James and John earlier in the gospel. But while they had asked for status and gory, Bartimaeus asks for light! This blind man has definitely understood everything. He instinctively knew that true light can only come from the One who is light Himself. Unlike with the case of James and John, this time Jesus fulfills the petitioner's desire. And as soon as "the man regained his sight, he followed Jesus on the way." In other words, Bartimaeus who, up till that moment, had been a poor, blind, wretched beggar, became a disciple in the true sense of the word. In the Acts of the Apostles, before being called "Christians" the followers of Jesus were always referred to as "followers of the Way".

The story of Bartimaeus can be our own story. Because, like him, we too can often be blinded in our lives. Our selfishness, hurts suffered, past experiences, and so many other things can blind us from seeing the true light. Like Bartimaeus, let us be humble enough to ask Jesus to have mercy on us and give us the true light.
