# Pastor's thoughts ...



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"The child leaped in her womb."

At the center of today's gospel, we have two pregnant women, and two unborn children still in their mothers' wombs, one of them leaping with joy. As we prepare for the birth of Him who has been called "King of kings" and "Lord of Lords", the liturgy does not present us with some nobleman, knights in shing armor, or people of power in their highfloor offices. Instead, we have two realities which were very low down the scale of importance in society: women and children. It seems that, from the very beginning, God wanted to make sure that we understand that His ways are not our ways, that with Him the first become last and vice-versa. Mary was right when, following the angel's visit and

while she was still unsure about what and how it was going to happen, she burst out in song proclaiming that God "has looked on his lowly servant". In humility, out of humble beginnings, through the vulnerability of seemingly unimportant humans, God brought about what was to become the greatest event in human history.

It would be enough for us today if we stayed in the presence these two women and let them speak to us. We look at them as they share their joy, excitement and awe at all that was happening in them and through them. One of them was now well beyond the possibility of giving birth, while the other's pregnancy had nothing of the ordinary in it. As soon as Mary arrives at her doorstep, Elizabeth greets her with what is probably the most beautiful title Mary could ever get: "blessed is she who believed." Yes, Mary is declared blessed because she believed in something that went against all human logic. She might have not understood. She had been confused. Probably she still had a hundredand-one questions about this pregnancy and the child to be born. Yet, she freely and joyfully said yes because she believed that God wanted something from her and that He could make it happen.

We are celebrating the second Christmas under the shadows cast by Covid. Some of us have suffered more than others during these last two years. Others are still scared of what might happen, and all of us experience uncertainties about what's going to happen next. And yet, we have Christmas once more to remind us that Jesus came in the midst of all this. He was born in poverty, lacking all basic securities. He came into a world full of turmoil and anxieties. As

an unmarried mother, Mary had all her fears allayed as she allowed God to take over. Her song, the Magnificat, was one of praise, thanksgiving and joy. "The Almighty has done great things for me," she says, not allowing her humility to diminish God's powerful action working in her.

We all have our moments of darkness, uncertainties, pains or problems in our lives. The story of Christmas tells us that Jesus is not embarrassed to enter into these realities. On the contrary, it is precisely in these stories that he wants to enter, to be re-born.

"Blessed is she who believed," Elizabeth said. Do we believe that Jesus can do wonders in our lives too, like He did in the lives of Mary and Elizabeth?
