Pastor's thoughts ...



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There are moments in life which can never be rightfully expressed in words, no matter how eloquent the writer may be. I witnessed one such moment during the prayer of the Way of the Cross led by Pope Francis at the Colosseum in Rome. During the thirteenth station, Christ's death on the Cross, one Ukrainian and one Russian nurse carried the cross together. Meanwhile, Pope Francis was covering his face in deep prayer. It was a gesture that created a lot of controversy, for which some religious and political authorities had expressed their disapproval. Like any prophetic gesture, no words are needed to explain or justify it. It only needs to be witnessed. And the most eloquent scene was watching the two women looking at each other. Only God knows what was going through

their minds at that particular moment. Questions that remain unanswered, hope for a better future, feelings for each other's pains. Whatever the thoughts, one thing is certain. By insisting to go ahead with what was being planned, in spite of everything, these two women showed that there is something much bigger and more powerful than the evil engulfing their respective countries. In a situation where there seems to be no hope, where evil forces seem to be having the upper hand, they dare to give a positive sign of reconciliation. They dare to hope.

This is precisely the message of the Resurrection which we are celebrating today. Looking at the events which we have been celebrating during these last couple of days, we see a story of betrayal, abandonment, brutality, injustice, and death. Evil seems to have had the upper hand. For some, Jesus and his message were uncomfortable, and they had to get rid of him. Now, on that Friday afternoon, the must have thought that it was all over. After death there is no more hope. They probably took his cry from the cross, "it is finished", as their victory cry.

But God had other plans. Early on the Sunday He showed that He is more powerful than all the evil combined. He is even more powerful than death itself, the paradigm of all that is wrong.

In his gospel St Luke tells us that some of his close friends – women – refuse to let go. They go to the tomb early in the morning to anoint the body – for a last look, a final good-bye. But all they find is an empty tomb. After moments of anguish and confusion, they believe. They run to share the news, but are only met with incredulity.

It is not easy to believe in the resurrection, that good is stronger than evil. Perhaps, unfortunately, we are too accustomed to bad things happening around us. Whether it's in the news or in our family (because, unfortunately,

sometimes we do not need to travel far to see evil at work), it seems that bad things constantly happen everywhere. The message of Easter does not deny this. His death was real, and the power of evil was really at work. But what Easter tells us is that the story does not end there. "Why do you seek him amongst the dead? He is not here. He is risen!". Indeed, there is life after death, there is hope after disillusion.

This is why the Resurrection of Jesus is so central to our faith. Jesus is not a mere historical figure of the past. He is Risen. He is Alive. And this sure gives us hope in moments of darkness, light when only darkness is all that we can see.

Happy Easter to you all. May the light of the Resurrected Christ shine always in your lives. - Fr Mario
