From the Desk of Fr. Roy...



Over the years, a popular question has been the meaning and significance of the ascension of Jesus Christ. I shall attempt to provide an answer in this reflection. Following His resurrection, Jesus showed Himself to the women close to the tomb, to His followers, and to over 500 other people. In the days following His resurrection, Jesus provided instruction to His disciples about the kingdom of God. On the fortieth day after the resurrection, Jesus and His disciples journeyed to Mount Olivet, near Jerusalem. Jesus assured His followers that the Holy Spirit would soon be given to them, and He commanded them to stay in Jerusalem until the Spirit had descended.

Jesus gave a blessing upon them and then rose into heaven. It is clear from the Bible that Jesus returned to heaven in His physical body. He ascended from the ground slowly and visibly, closely watched by many attentive observers. As the disciples watched intently, attempting to get a last glimpse of Jesus, a cloud obscured Him from their sight, and two angels came and promised that Christ would come back "in the same way that you have seen Him go". The Ascension of Jesus Christ holds significance for multiple reasons, among which is the fact it concluded his earthly ministry. Almighty God had mercifully sent His Son into the world at Bethlehem, and now the Son was journeying back to the Father. Humanity had reached the point where restrictions were no longer present. It signified the success of His earthly work. All that He had hoped to accomplish had been achieved. It signaled the reappearance of His celestial glory. During Jesus' stay on earth, His majesty was hidden with a single exception of the Transfiguration. It showed His exaltation by the Father. The One who the Father was pleased with was taken up in honor and given a name greater than all other names. It gave Him the

opportunity to make a place for us. It symbolized the start of His task as High Priest and Mediator of the New Covenant. It established the outline for His return. Upon Jesus' return to establish His Kingdom, He will come back to us in the same physical form He departed-bodily, visibly, and in the clouds. The Lord Jesus is now in heaven. The Scriptures regularly illustrate Him in a place of honor and authority at the right hand of the Father. Christ is the supreme authority of the Church, the source of spiritual gifts, and the One who is all-encompassing.



STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION: This Sunday we celebrate the great feast of the Ascension of the Lord which is ripe with spiritual importance and depth. Let us examine how the Lord's ascension affects us as stewards. Firstly, when the apostles watched the Lord ascend into heaven, two angels appeared and asked them "why do you stand looking up toward heaven?" The apostles were not meant to stay there constantly gazing heavenward. Instead, they, like us, are called to live firmly on this earth with our whole purpose set on reaching heaven and leading as many people with us as possible. We see this at the end of St. Matthew's Gospel when Jesus gives the great commission to "make disciples of all nations." Jesus' ascension is a firm call to action. A call to be stewards and use our gifts to spread the Gospel within our parishes and the Church. We do this through the strength of Christ within us who says "remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." It is now up to us to cooperate with the Spirit and make disciples of the whole world. Let us end by pondering the beautiful saying of St. Teresa of Avila. "Christ has no body now but yours. No hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes through which He looks compassion on this world. Yours are the feet with which He walks to do good. Yours are the hands through which He blesses all the world. Yours are the hands, yours are the feet, yours are the eyes, you are His Body. Christ has no body now on earth but yours."

Jesus' ascension is a firm call to action for at the end of St. Matthew's Gospel He gives us the great commission to "make disciples of all nations." This is a call to be stewards and use our gifts to spread the Gospel within our parishes and the Church. Let us strive to do this through the strength of Christ within us who says "remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Gospel Summary

The Gospel reading today concludes the Book of Matthew. It was at this point that Jesus, knowing he was about to return to the Father, commissioned the apostles to carry the message of the Good News into the whole world. They would baptize, make more disciples, and teach the message Jesus had taught them. Jesus made it clear that his ascension did not mark an absence; he would always be with them. This Gospel message is the foundation of the Church and makes clear what we are called to do and be.

Reflection for Families

We don't need to go to the four corners of the earth to be missionaries. We are called as parents to the same mission as the apostles. We are the first and most significant teachers of our children. We bring them to baptism and show them the Good News. Not only our actions speak to our children about what we believe and how we hope they live Christian lives, but our efforts to prepare them for the sacraments and come to the Lord's table every week helps them know the full depth of our faith.

Bringing the Gospel Into Your Family

During the past weeks we have been reminded often by Jesus that he will not leave us alone. Sometimes it's hard to explain to children where someone is who we can't see. Like the people in the early Church we have faith, but we also have doubt. As if it were a scavenger hunt, let family members look for places they find Jesus this week. In what way can your family help others know Jesus' presence?
