

MALTESE CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS

Maltese Christmas traditions are a sight to behold, filled with diverse and beautiful customs that reflect their faith and culture. One can't help but be captivated by the sensory details that bring these traditions to life.

In the Maltese community, a unique Christmas tradition involves the growing of vetches (Gulbiena) from canary seeds. Another tradition that catches the eye is the building of elaborate nativity scenes (presepji) adorned with clay figures (pasturi) and featuring local elements like stone walls and prickly pears. The attention to detail in these scenes is remarkable, and some are even mechanized and animated, creating a mesmerizing spectacle that entices visitors during the festive season.

The Maltese Christmas dessert, known as pudding (pudina tal-hobz), is a delightful treat that tantalizes the taste buds. Made from stale bread, dried fruits, nuts, spices, and cocoa, the aroma of this dessert fills the air, creating a warm and comforting atmosphere. It's a delicious way to savor the flavors of the season.

The atmosphere on Christmas Eve is filled with anticipation as many Maltese attend midnight mass (il -Messa ta' fil-Ghaxija), held in every church and cathedral. The sounds of hymns and prayers fill the air, creating a sense of reverence and devotion. A special highlight of this mass is the sermon (il-Priedka tat-Tifel), delivered by a young boy or girl, adding a youthful innocence to the proceedings.

Christmas Day brings joy and togetherness for Maltese families. They exchange gifts and gather around a festive table, filled with the aroma of roasted turkey, potatoes, vegetables, and wine. The atmosphere is filled with laughter and merriment, creating a sense of warmth and love. A common



dessert enjoyed on this day is the honey ring (qaghaq tal-ghasel), its sweet fragrance wafting through the air, tempting everyone's taste buds. Filled with a mixture of honey, citrus, spices, and nuts, this pastry is a delectable indulgence.
