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

THE HOLY FAMILY

Gospel Summary

In today's Gospel, Mary and Joseph—obedient Jewish parents—present Jesus at the Temple in Jerusalem. There they meet Simeon, a holy man who blesses God for having seen with his own eyes Christ the Lord. Mary and Joseph also meet the prophetess, Anna, who worships in the Temple day and night. She too gives thanks to God, realizing that the child is Jesus, who will be the redemption of Jerusalem.

Reflection for Parents

Just as Mary and Joseph presented Jesus at the Temple, most Catholic parents have presented their children for Baptism in their parish churches. But beyond the day of presentation, beyond the day of Baptism, it is in the everyday living out of our faith that our children come to know more deeply the love of God. Pray today to be an everyday example of God's love to your children. Pray that they, like Jesus, may grow "and become strong, filled with wisdom."

Bringing the Gospel into Your Family

On this Feast of the Holy Family, share with your children your memories of the holiness of elderly members of your family and their ancestors. Recall stories you have heard about them, share photographs of them, and—if available—share the family Bible that contains your family tree. If such a family tree is not available, create one together. Write on the tree the names of family members, and draw pictures or symbols that represent them. Display the family tree in a prominent place, and add to it as needed. Be sure to include your own family members on the family tree!



From our Pastor's Desk...



On this First Sunday after Christmas, the Church invites all of us to reflect on the beauty of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. They are the perfect model of love, faith and obedience for all Christian families. By meditating on the Holy Family, we can learn how we are called to live in our own homes and grow in holiness.

St. John Paul II says that "the Holy Family is the beginning of countless other holy families." This means that every family that follows the example of the Holy Family can become a holy family too. A holy family is not one that is free from problems or

difficulties, but one that trusts in God's providence and seeks to do His will in everything.

The Holy Family teaches us how to work towards holiness through our daily family life. St. Josemaria Escriva says that "in the home of the Holy Family in Nazareth, Jesus, Mary and Joseph sanctified their ordinary life, without doing anything spectacular or newsworthy. They led a life that was to all appearances, the same as that of their neighbours, a life that was important, not because of the material things they did but because of the love that they put into these things."

Essentially, the Holy Family did ordinary things with extraordinary love. They too had to work, cook meals, clean the house, and wash their clothes and every other regular activity that we too perform. Yet, endowed with love for one another, these seemingly minute tasks became great sources of sanctification. For example, when Mary prepared a meal for her family, she did it with care and gratitude, offering it to God as a sacrifice of praise. When Joseph worked as a carpenter, he did it with diligence and honesty, honoring God with his labor. When Jesus obeyed his parents and helped them in their chores, he did it with humility and joy, pleasing God with his obedience.

We too should look to be stewards in our own homes by using our time and gifts to serve our family. One tangible thing we can avoid is complaining about performing house chores but rather strive to see them as an opportunity to love our family members, and by extension, love Christ. For example, when we wash the dishes, we can thank God for the food we have and pray for those who are hungry. When we tidy up our rooms, we can offer it for the souls in purgatory who are waiting for God's mercy. When we help our siblings with their homework, we can share our knowledge and skills with generosity and kindness.

As we strive to be stewards in our parish communities, let us also follow the model of the Holy Family and be stewards in our own homes and, by extension, our parish communities as well. For example, when we attend Mass, we can participate actively and reverently, joining our prayers and sacrifices with those of the Holy Family. When we volunteer for a ministry, we can do it with enthusiasm and responsibility, serving God and His people with the spirit of the Holy Family. When we support our parish financially, we can do it with gratitude and generosity, giving back to God what He has given us through the Holy Family.

By meditating on the Holy Family, we can learn how to live in our own homes and grow in holiness. The Holy Family did ordinary things with extraordinary love, sanctifying their daily life. We too can do the same by being stewards in our own homes and using our time and gifts to serve our family with love and sacrifice. We can also follow the model of the Holy Family in our parish communities, participating, volunteering and supporting with the same love and sacrifice. In this way, we can become holy families that honor God and bless others.




