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
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

THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Gospel Summary

Jesus continues to call disciples to come and follow him. Simon and Andrew left their nets to follow him. James and John left their nets, their father, and their hired men to follow him. Jesus' presence and Jesus' words moved these men to leave everything behind, even though they did not fully understand that to which they were being called.

Reflection for Parents

In Catholic parishes throughout the world we continue to see in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) children, youth, and adults who are answering the call to follow Jesus. They come to the Church curious about who Jesus is, what he teaches, and what following him means in their daily lives. We are a part of the community that encourages and guides them on their journey of conversion. But **9:00am** conversion, the turning of our minds and our hearts and our lives to God, is something we are all called to. Today is a good day to think about where we need to turn to or turn back to God. What do we hear him calling us to do? To change? To be?

Bringing the Gospel into Your Family

Lead a fun discussion about all the things each family member did today. Conclude by saving (in an exaggerated tone), "Whew! We were busy!" Then invite family members to think about where—in all the busyness—they took time to listen to the voice of Jesus. When did they pray? How did they serve him by helping or serving someone else? Challenge family members to take extra time for Jesus each day in the coming week. You may wish to make this a point of sharing each evening at dinnertime or at bedtime.



From our Pastor's Desk...



In this week's pastor's corner, I would like to emphasize the significance of praying for unity among Christians. I would like to invite all to join us at an upcoming event scheduled for this coming Sunday, January 21st, at 4pm at St. Mark Coptic Orthodox Cathedral 455 Ferrier St. (Steeles Ave. E. & Warden Ave.), Markham. Please join Archbishop Francis Leo and a diverse group of Christian leaders in praying for the restoration of full visible unity, as willed by Jesus Christ for the Church. I would like to offer some insight into the historical context of this annual event. In 1908, the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity was established as the Octave of Christian Unity, placing significant emphasis on the act of prayer for the unity of the church. Father Paul Wattson, cofounder of the Graymoor Franciscan Friars, proposed the dates of the week. He conceived of the week beginning on the Feast of the Confession of Peter, the variant of the ancient Feast of the Chair of Saint Peter, on 18 January, and concluding with the Feast of the Conversion of Saint Paul on 25 January.

Pope Pius X granted his official blessing to the concept, while Benedict XV actively promoted its observance across the Roman Catholic Church. To emphasize the relationship between Christian unity and the Petrine See, Wattson temporarily renamed the observance as the "Chair of Unity Octave".

In the mid-1920s, Protestant leaders further suggested an annual period of prayer for Christian unity, taking place before Pentecost Sunday, the customary observance of the Church's birthday.

If you cannot attend this upcoming event, I would like to encourage you to pray for its success and to explore opportunities for engaging with fellow Christians in our neighbourhood and the wider community.

STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION Fishing for Christ "Come follow me and I will make you fishers of people." Just as Jesus called his first disciples 2000 years ago, he continues to call us to follow him. As we reflect on this beautiful Gospel account, let us focus on one particular aspect, the fact that Jesus uses the image of being a "fisher." It is most interesting to note that as he is calling actual fishermen, he uses their own language. There is a deep spiritual insight that can be gleaned from this, namely, that Christ uses what we bring to the table to serve Him and the Church. While fishing may seem unrelated to being an apostle, Jesus does not downplay their past experience. He invites them to bring all of the gifts and talents that they've received from God, but instead of using it for their own gain, to use it to gain souls for Christ. So too as stewards, we can sometimes think that God can only use us if we're already perfect disciples, or have degrees in theology or extensive training in ministry. However, the Lord wants us to bring all of our experiences, even our personal and professional backgrounds to serve Him. If we have backgrounds in finance or accounting, we can use that to help assist various parish ministries. Likewise, if we have experience as a teacher, we can utilize those gifts through various catechist or RCIA groups. This is the heart of stewardship. To recognize that we all bring our own particular gifts that can be used to serve Christ. Let us reflect on our own gifts and graciously heed the call to become "fishers of people," each in our own way. Summary As Jesus calls the apostles, He uses their own language by inviting them to be "fishers of people."
