22ND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Gospel Summary

The Pharisees and scribes in today's Gospel reading were eager to point out the religious traditions that some of the disciples were breaking. Jesus chided them, pointing out that they were more concerned with keeping the traditions than they were with keeping God's laws. Jesus explained that what is most important is what comes from within a person, and from a person's heart.

Reflection for Parents

A story passed on by a Native American father to his son describes the torment of two wolves living inside the father's head. One wolf was evil and vicious. The other was kind and loving. When the son questioned his father about which wolf reacted in certain situations. the father explained that it was whichever wolf he fed. Reread verses 21-23 from today's Gospel. Reflect on whether you are feeding any of the attitudes or

behaviors listed. Invite God to create a new heart in you and to give you a right spirit. Think about what you can do to feed your heart and spirit so that they grow in generosity, goodness, purity, truth, and faithfulness.

Bringing the Good News Into Your Family

Prepare together several cutout hearts from red construction paper. Write on the hearts, "You have a good heart!" Gather the hearts in a basket, and place the basket on your family prayer table.

Talk with your family about ways you know that a person has a good heart. For example, if a family member takes time to help mom fold laundry without being asked to do so, that family member has a good heart. If another family member donates his or her change to the parish's ministry to the poor, that person has a good heart.

Invite family members to give a heart to each person they see doing a "good heart" action at home in the coming week. At the end of the week, you may wish to see who has collected the most hearts and to give that person a small prize or a special treat.

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
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On this Labour Day weekend, let us reflect on its spiritual meaning. God created human beings to work and take care of His creation. Work is not a result of the Fall or punishment for sin, but rather a fundamental part of our design. It is through work that we participate in God's ongoing work of creation and stewardship. Even before the Fall, when sin entered the world, God gave man work as a means of purpose and enjoyment. Ecclesiastes 2:24-25 emphasizes the significance of finding satisfaction in one's work, highlighting that it is a gift from God. It reminds us that without God, we could not sustain ourselves or experience the joy that work can bring. Therefore, work is not merely a means of survival, but also a means of finding purpose and fulfillment in life.

In our work, we can be a witness to the reality of Christ and the difference he makes in the lives of his followers. Through our actions, words, and attitudes, we can show a supernatural approach to work that sets us apart from the world. Whether it is through our integrity, kindness, or perseverance, we have the chance to show others the transformative power of Christ in our lives. This witness can have a profound impact on those around us, leading them to seek a relationship with God themselves.

STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION: The Pharisees were devout Jewish men. They diligently followed the laws of Moses and the traditions of the elders which were passed on to them, and yet in the Gospel we see them being rebuked for being the hypocrites that Isiah prophesized about. Although the Pharisees followed the law, Jesus sees their heart and saw that their actions did not come from a place of loving God and his law, but of pride and self-reliance. He tells the crowd "Nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person; but the things that come out from within are what defile." In our desire for holiness, it can be easy to be caught up with the externals. As we participate more fully in the work of stewardship, it can be a temptation to share our time and talent because of the praise that we receive from the parishioners or pastor, and feel dejected when that praise does not come. Yet as Jesus reminds us in the gospel, our actions alone aren't what makes us holy, but it is what comes from within. As St Paul says in the second reading, "be doers of the word and not hearers only." When we truly listen and allow God's word to take root in our hearts, we undergo conversion and our actions that come from this conversion will be out of love and gratitude for God. As we listen to God's word, let us pray that we can allow it to take root in our hearts and transform us, producing within us fruits which we can share with those around us. Let us remember the words of St. Paul in the second reading, that every perfect gift comes from God. The gifts that we have come from the Lord, and we should share them out of gratitude for Him. Let us take time this week to evaluate the work that we do towards building up the kingdom of God, and ensure that all that we do is a labour of love, responding to the generous gifts God has given us and not out of selfish desires to be

To follow the law means nothing if not done out of love, for as Jesus says in the Gospel, that the things that come out from within are what defile the person. It can be easy for us in the work of stewardship to no longer share our time and talent out of love, but selfish motives as the Pharisees were doing in the Gospel. Let us always keep in mind that the gifts that we have are from the Lord, and that we share them out of gratitude for God who blesses us.
