In each response, and according to each group's circumstance, John emphasizes keeping or taking only what is needed or prescribed. John also makes it clear to all that the Christ for whom they have been waiting is yet to come.

Reflection for Parents

This Gospel highlights several Christian values that are learned in the home—generosity, fairness, truthfulness, and contentment with what you have. Take some time today to think about each of these values. How are your children learning these values through your example? How can you make these values more a part of your family life as Christmas nears?

Bringing the Good News Into Your Family At this halfway point in Advent, choose as a

family one way you can share what you have with others. Perhaps you can donate gently used coats and sweaters or new hats and mittens to a local shelter. If your parish food pantry is in need of donations, go grocery shopping and help meet the need for food. If you are a musically gifted family, plan to carol in your neighborhood or at a local care facility.

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From the Pastor...

The Meaning and Symbolism of the Third Sunday of Advent

As we journey through this holy season of Advent, we find ourselves approaching a significant milestone: Gaudete Sunday, the Third Sunday of Advent. The Introit for Gaudete Sunday comes from Philippians 4:4-5: "Gaudete in Domino semper" ("Rejoice in the Lord always"). This call to rejoice invites us to pause and reflect on the joy and hope that the coming of Christ brings into our lives.

Gaudete Sunday: A Shift in Focus

Advent is a time of penance, prayer, and preparation, much like Lent. The priest's purple vestments remind us of the penitential nature of this season. However, Gaudete Sunday offers a moment of reprieve as we pass the midpoint of Advent. The Church lightens the mood, and the priest may wear rose vestments. This change in color is meant to encourage us to continue our spiritual preparation for Christmas with renewed vigor.

The Symbolism of the Rose Candle

On this special Sunday, we light the third candle of the Advent wreath, which is traditionally rose-colored. This candle symbolizes joy and rejoicing, reflecting the light that Christ brings into our world. It serves as a visual reminder that the Lord's coming is near, and we should prepare our hearts to welcome Him with gladness.

The Sacrament of Confession: A Path to Renewal

As disciples of Jesus, part of our preparation for Christmas involves seeking reconciliation with God through the Sacrament of Confession. This sacrament is one of the most unique and beautiful aspects of our Catholic faith. In His abundant love and mercy, Jesus Christ established the Sacrament of Confession so that we, as sinners, can obtain forgiveness for our sins and reconcile with God and the Church.

Through this sacrament, we are "washed clean" and renewed in Christ. As Jesus said in John 20:21-23, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, even so I send you. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

Experience Peace and Love

If it has been a while since you last went to Confession, I encourage you to take this opportunity to return. The Church welcomes you with open arms and invites you to participate in this beautiful sacrament of healing. Many Catholics describe feelings of peace, joy, relief, and love after receiving Reconciliation—feelings that they never expected. Jesus is calling you to experience His mercy in this way too. On Tuesday, December 17th confessions are available from 10 am to noon in both English and Maltese.

Preparing Our Hearts

As we light the rose candle this Gaudete Sunday, let us remember that our preparation for Christmas goes beyond decorations and festive gatherings. It is a call to prepare our hearts spiritually. Let us take the time to go to Confession, to seek God's forgiveness, and to open our hearts to His love and mercy. By doing so, we can truly rejoice in the Lord always, as St. Paul encourages us.

Conclusion

As we continue our Advent journey, let us keep the spirit of Gaudete Sunday alive in our hearts. Let us rejoice in the hope and love that the birth of Christ brings. May our preparations lead us to a deeper relationship with God and a greater appreciation of His infinite mercy.
