### **EPIPHANY OF OUR LORD**

### Gospel Summary

The Magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem, asking the whereabouts of the newborn king of the Jews. Herod was troubled by this news of the birth, as was all of Jerusalem. He sent the Magi to Bethlehem to search for the child, asking that they bring the child to him so that he could do the child homage. The Magi set out and followed the star to the place where the child was. They did the child homage and offered him their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. But they were warned in a dream not to return to Herod, and they left for their country by a different route.

#### **Reflection for Parents**

This Gospel narrative is full of adventure, danger, mystery, and yes—gifts! During this Christmas season, enjoy dramatizing this Gospel as a family. Then think about how far you would travel, how far you would go to pay homage to Jesus. Would you go as far as your parish to receive the Sacraments or to spend some time in quiet prayer? Would you go as far as the soup kitchen to serve a meal to the hungry? Would you go as far as to tell someone to stop bullying a classmate or a coworker? Would you go as far as to give up a morning cup of coffee or a favorite treat in order to give to someone in need the gift of food or clothing or the necessities of life? How far would you go? What would you give as your gifts to the King?

The star led the Magi to the place where Jesus was. With your family, cut out several vellow construction paper stars. On each star write either a way you can find Jesus—such as "read God's Word"—or the name of a person who has helped you find Jesus, such as "Grandma Joan." 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
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# From the Pastor...

This weekend we celebrate Epiphany, one of the oldest Christian feasts. The word "Epiphany" comes from a Greek verb meaning "to reveal." On this day, we remember how Jesus was revealed to the world as the Son of God.

Originally, Epiphany celebrated four events: the Baptism of Jesus, His first miracle at the wedding in Cana, His birth (the Nativity), and the visit of the Wise Men. Each of these events shows us who Jesus is:

At His Baptism, the Holy Spirit descended and God's voice said Jesus is His Son.

At the wedding in Cana, Jesus performed a miracle by changing water into wine.

At His birth, angels announced His arrival and shepherds came to worship Him.

When the Wise Men visited, they recognized Jesus' divinity and brought Him gifts.

Epiphany is important because it marks the end of the Twelve Days of Christmas, which begin with Jesus' birth and end with His revelation to the Gentiles (non-Jews) when the Wise Men visited.

In many parts of Europe, Epiphany is as important as Christmas. People exchange gifts to remember the Wise Men's gifts to Jesus.

Epiphany is also called Three Kings Day because of the Gospel reading about the Wise Men. These strangers from afar honored Jesus, not His own people or King Herod. This shows that Jesus came for everyone, not just the Jews.

As disciples of Jesus, Epiphany reminds us to follow His light and share it with others. We seek Jesus in our daily lives and try to live according to His teachings. This means showing love, kindness, and helping those in need.

New Year's resolutions are common during this time. While it's good to set personal goals, let's also resolve to show God's love by doing something extra for those we love and our community. As St. Francis of Assisi said, "Preach the gospel at all times. When necessary, use words."

May we continue to seek Jesus, follow His light, and live our faith with joy and commitment. Let us share His love and shine His light for the world to see.

**STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION** Being a Visible Witness As we continue along in this wondrous season of Christmas, we are invited to reflect on the Epiphany of the Lord this Sunday. The word epiphany means "to make manifest" or "to make known." So on this feast day we are celebrating how God made himself known to all the nations, which is symbolized through the visit of the foreign Magi. As stewards, we are called to help the Church in her efforts to continue to make Christ known to the ends of the earth. The way of stewardship is essentially a call to evangelization. The greatest gift we can share with others is not money or food, but the knowledge and love of Christ. Pope Francis says that "we cannot keep ourselves shut up in parishes, in our communities, when so many people are waiting for the Gospel!" We must go out of our comfort zone to bring others to Jesus. One way we can evangelize others is by simply living as visible Catholic disciples in our world. In today's secular culture, any act of religiosity is seen as a radical witness of our faith. For example, whenever we are eating in public, we can begin with the sign of the cross and our grace before meals. Moreover, St. John Paul II said that we should not be "ashamed to recite the Rosary alone, while you walk along the streets to school, to the university or to work, or as you commute by public transport." Let us strive to be a sign of our faith to the world. Summary The feast of the Epiphany of the Lord celebrates how God made himself known to all the nations, which is symbolized through the visit of the foreign Magi. As stewards, we are called to help the Church in her efforts to make Christ known to the ends of the earth and we can do this by simply being a visible witness of our faith. Let us strive to make small actions that display our love for Christ such as saying grace before meals in public, praying the rosary on the bus or saying "God bless you" when someone sneezes or we say goodbye.

Pope Francis recently inaugurated the 2025 Jubilee of Hope, a significant event for the Catholic Church that occurs every 25 years, encouraging Catholics to make pilgrimages to Rome. This year, Pope Francis chose "Hope" as the central theme of the Jubilee. Pilgrims can obtain an indulgence by visiting the Holy Doors at designated basilicas

in Rome, such as St. Peter's Basilica, which was opened on Christmas Eve, December 24, 2024. In addition to St. Peter's Basilica, a Holy Door was also opened at Rome's Rebibbia Prison to symbolize hope for inmates. Pilgrims must pass through metal detectors and other security checks to enter St. Peter's Square. The Jubilee will conclude with the closing of the Holy Door on January 6, 2026, the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord. Pope Francis emphasized that the Jubilee aims to strengthen faith and recognize Christ in our midst. The Jubilee also includes special events and celebrations, such as the canonization of Carlo Acutis, the first millennial saint.

#### Here is the prayer composed by Pope Francis for the Jubilee:

"Father in heaven, may the faith you have given us in your son, Jesus Christ, our brother, and the flame of charity enkindled in our hearts by the Holy Spirit, reawaken in us the blessed hope for the coming of your Kingdom. May your grace transform us into tireless cultivators of the seeds of the Gospel. May those seeds transform from within both humanity and the whole cosmos in the sure expectation of a new heaven and a new earth, when, with the powers of Evil vanquished, your glory will shine eternally. May the grace of the Jubilee reawaken in us, Pilgrims of Hope, a yearning for the treasures of heaven. May that same grace spread the joy and peace of our Redeemer throughout the earth. To you our God, eternally blessed, be glory and praise for ever. Amen."

# UPDATE ON HEATING SYSTEM FOR THE CHURCH

After weeks of discussing the best heating system, the project is now **complete**. The cost is close to **\$80,000**. Our accumulated savings funded the project.

It's not surprising that an older building like ours will, from time to time, require repair or replacement, depending on the need. Although we don't expect any immediate future issues that require fixing, we feel it prudent to keep our savings at a comfortable level in order to handle our day-to-day expenses.
