From the Pastor...

This week, I want to talk about the Jubilee Year called by Pope Francis. It's a special time in the Catholic Church, filled with grace and pilgrimage. The Jubilee Year, which started on Christmas Eve, 2024, is focused on the theme of "Hope". Pope Francis chose this theme to remind us of the significance of hope, especially during difficult times.

What is the Jubilee?

A plenary indulgence is a remission of the temporal punishment due for sins that have already been forgiven in confession. To receive this indulgence, one must make a pilgrimage to the Holy Door, receive the Sacraments of Penance and the Eucharist, and pray for the intentions of the Pope.

Through Baptism we are freed from sin and reborn as sons of God; we become members of Christ, are incorporated into the Church and made sharers in her mission." Let us reflect on how Jesus' baptism can teach us more about our own baptism. Firstly, Jesus didn't need to get baptized because he was already without sin. However, in doing so, He became a model for how we should be baptized for the forgiveness of our sins. Similarly, as stewards we are called to be authentic models of the faith to others. When people see us, do they see what it means to be a disciple? We should be examples of how to live a holy and virtuous life so that others may be inspired by our lives of stewardship. Moreover, not only is it important to do good, but we must also consciously try to avoid anything that may scandal others. All of the baptized, especially stewards, represent Christ and the Church. If we perform actions that are negative or hurtful, people who observe us may be turned away from the faith. Of course, we are all human and are bound to make mistakes, but we should strive to avoid anything that may significantly hinder others from accepting the faith. Let us always turn to Jesus for help, our true model of holiness and stewardship.

As we celebrate the feast of the Baptism of the Lord, we should first realize that Jesus didn't need to be baptized but rather did so in order to give us an example to imitate. Similarly, as stewards we are called to be authentic models of the faith so that others can be inspired by our witness. Moreover, it is extremely important that we avoid anything that may scandal others because this could drive them away from the Church. Let us strive to be true models of the faith.
